

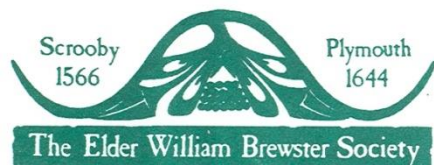

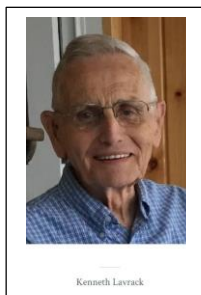

## HOW TO JOIN THE MAYFLOWER SOCIETY

Many people ask me how you join the Mayflower Society and what the procedure is for approval. Here are some tips to help you.

1. **Contact your State Society**
  - a. Every State of the union, plus Europe and Canada and soon to be Australia has its own society. Some large states have “ Colonies” or smaller branches of the State Society so that members throughout the state can be active and attend meetings. You may find information on State Societies by going to [www.mayflowersociety.org](http://www.mayflowersociety.org) on the left side of the page, you will find **JOIN GSMD**. Click on the icon. Then Click, Contact your Society. It will bring you to the name of the State Historian and his or her email. Most states also have their own websites where you can get information as well. You may join any state you lie, there is no requirement to join the state in which you live, but if you wish to be active, and your state would be where you would join.
  - b. The State Historian, or person responsible for new members will give you instructions on how to join. The Historian will then ask you to fill out a preliminary application which he/she will check to see if it’s a viable line. In some cases this can be done on the State Web Site. You will then be asked to mail in the required fees (each state sets their own fee scale) The Historian will add onto a worksheet, all information

that they can find pertaining to your line that has already been approved, and send you a set of instructions to help you with your project. In some cases the Historian will check the Plymouth files as well.

## 2. DOCUMENTATION REQUIREMENTS.

Each birth, marriage and death of the Mayflower carrier (the person who carries the bloodline to the Mayflower ancestor) must be documented as well as the spouse’s birth and death. Primary source material is best, (birth, marriage, death certificates) but there are other sources that can be used:

1. **Primary Source Records** – means a source that was created at the time of the event, such as a birth, death or marriage certificate. Other primary sources are Probate and land records, some state and federal census records after 1850, Diaries, letters, etc. Primary sources work best because they are more believable and hopefully accurate.
2. **Secondary Sources** – means a source that was created after the event, such as a bible record, Genealogies, Town histories, etc. Transcribed records. These records are not as good as primary records but can be used when primary sources are not available.
3. **Circumstantial Sources** – These are records that are not primary or secondary, but can add to the credibility of the date of the event.

These could be undocumented genealogies, taped interviews with relatives, etc. These records MUST be backed up with either a primary or a secondary record. They will not stand alone.

4. **Mayflower Families (Silver Books) –**

These are very well documented publications many of which have been researched by the Mayflower Society. If you find information about your ancestor in these books, they can be used as well. As with all other publications errors do occur on occasion. Most of these books will take care of the first FIVE generations for you.

5. **Scholarly Journals –** There are many scholarly journals that can be used for documentation such as.

- a. **The Mayflower Descendant**
- b. **The New England Historical Genealogical Register**
- c. **The Connecticut Nutmegger**
- d. **The N Y Genealogical and Biographical Record.**
- e. **And many, many others.**

There are certain types of records which are NOT accepted. Those are family trees that are found on Ancestry. Com, Familysearch.org, and World family Tree. Etc. These are not accepted because they are records that were added onto these web sites without documentation and often are incorrect. Records from other genealogical are also not accepted unless they are copies of original records. The Mayflower Society required that the actual

certificates for events that happened after 1900 be provided, as most of the time they are widely available. Transcriptions of record can be used for events that happened before 1900.

Records that are used from online web sites, must be the copy of the original record, not the transcription page that is often listed. For instance, you will often see the print out of a census record, but it is the actual census record that is needed for the documentation (The whole page, not just the line you ancestor is listed on) Your State Historian can guide you if you have any questions as to whether a record is acceptable or not.

### **Worksheet**

The State Historian will fill out the worksheet with as much information as they have available and then send it on to you for completion.

When you have completed the worksheet you will need to include the following with the application for membership.

- a. The Completed Worksheet
- b. TWO copies of each document – A copy or an original document is fine, you do not need to send in the certified copy as it cannot be returned to you. One copy will accompany the application to Plymouth Headquarters and the second copy will remain with the state historian for their files.
- c. Be sure to send the package with tracking so that it won't get lost in the mail.



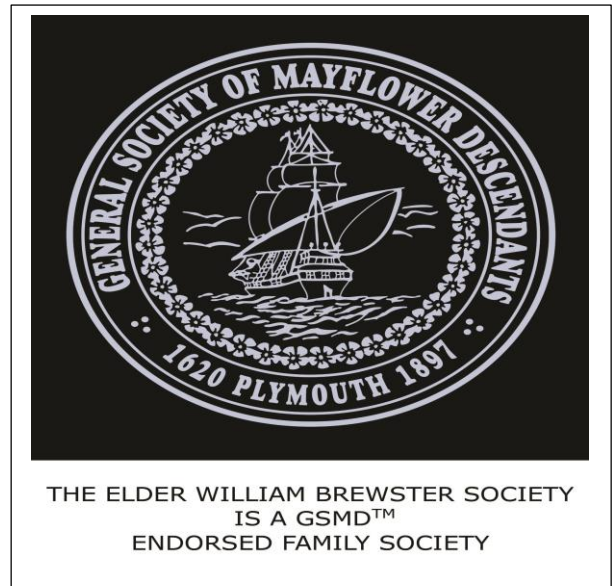
- d. Include any fees which you have not already paid that may be required such as the first year's dues.

### What Happens Next?

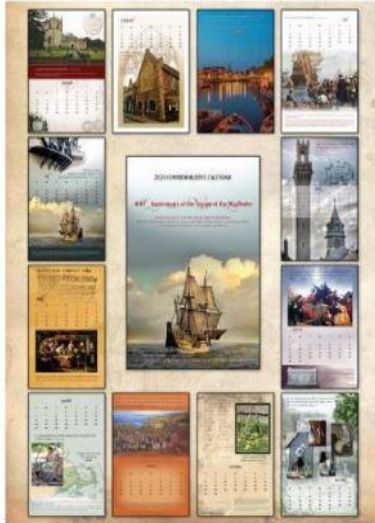
1. The State Historian will review your worksheet, make any corrections, verify your documents and when he/she feels that the requirements are fulfilled, he/she will approve the application at the State level and forward it to Plymouth, Ma to National Headquarters. IF anything is needed, they will contact you.
2. A typed copy on acid free paper will be sent to you for your signature.
3. Once reviewed at National Headquarters, your application and documents will be verified and cross check with resources they have.
4. Once the Director of Genealogical services and verifiers are satisfied that all requirements are met, it will be forwarded on to the Historian General for final approval. **The Entire Process can take up to four months or more depending on the number of applications that are preceding your application.** With 2020 next year, the applications are flowing into National at a pretty large pace.
5. Once the Historian General has approved your application, your state historian will be notified. He/she will contact you about your approval.
6. You will be invited to a meeting of your state society where you will receive your certificate of membership. This is not a requirement, you can have it mailed to you if you so wish. But going to

the meeting gives you a chance to meet other members.

If you wish to join the Mayflower Society so that you can participate in the festivities next year, I would suggest that you get your application in by March of 2020 if not earlier.

The Family of Joseph Brewster

#200 **Joseph Brewster** (Jonathan, Benjamin, Jonathan, William) (son of Jonathan and Judith Stevens Brewster #41) was born in Norwich, Ct on 13 April 1698 and died in Preston, Ct on 15 October 1770 and is buried in the Brewster Cemetery, Norwich, Ct. Joseph married in Norwich, Ct on 17 March 1723 to **Dorothy Witter**, who was born in Preston, Ct 11 December 1701 and died there on 30 April 1779 in her 77<sup>th</sup> year, also buried in the Brewster Cemetery, Norwich, Ct. She was the daughter of Ebenezer and Dorothy (Morgan) Witter and a stepdaughter of Daniel Brewster #42.

Joseph Brewster of Norwich, petitioned the probate court 29 June 1756 to have the estate of "my late honored father Mr. Jonathan Brewster deceased" with specific reference to the land set to "his widow my honored mother... now deceased" distributed. On 10 July 1756 distribution of "of the widow's dower was made to the children, "which estate descended to Jonathan the eldest son now deceased, Joseph, Lucretia, Sarah, now deceased, and Mary, Jonathan's share went to his children and representatives: Sarah's share to her lawful representatives. (New London probate File #688)

Joseph Brewster by vote of the members on 20 March 1760 was assigned the second seat before the pulpit in the Long Society/East Society of Norwich, Ct.

Joseph died intestate on 5 March 1771 Elijah, Joseph, Nathan, Jonathan, Ezra, Stephen and Jabez Brewster, with John Tracy and his wife, Elizabeth, all of Norwich children and heirs of Joseph Brewster agreed "to divide and set out unto each one of us" by quit claim deed from each other, "his or their part or portion of the Real Estate which our Honored father Joseph Brewster died seized of...as also by and with the free consent of our Honored Mother, Dorothy Brewster, Widow, and Relict of said Joseph Brewster, deceased, setting out and reserving to her, her right of Dower and Power of Thirds in and upon each ones part of share"

Joseph's children's births were not contemporarily recorded in Norwich, but were submitted "in Writing" by Joseph on 8 April 1763. All children were born in Norwich, CT

7. **Jacob Brewster** b. 26 Jan 1741
8. **Stephen Brewster** b. 4 March 1744
9. **Jabez Brewster** b. 16 Mar 1747.
